During this season of Ted Tannenbaum gratitude and sharing, we at Achievable have

found much to be thankful for. About a year and a half ago, I first wrote in these pages about our major initiative to provide access to health care by creating a community health clinic exclusively for children and adults with developmental and their disabilities families.

If you're reading this, it's most likely because you've been a supporter of this work in the past. We also trust it means you are interested in what we're doing now and what we will be doing going forward to support this under-served population. It also says you have a stake in our shared success. For that we say Thank You from the bottom of our hearts!

I am delighted to report that we are getting ever closer to reaching a major milestone in the history of our organization and it is in no small part due to the efforts of a large group of like-minded individuals. During the past year, with the help of our board, staff, grantors, funders and community volunteers we have begun to crystallize the vision of what a "patient-centered" clinic model can provide for our community. As we have gained that clarity, we have reached out to more and more foundations and organizations that are attracted to our mission and are willing to support it.

In this past year, we have received grants from private foundations, individuals and corporate donors totaling over \$700,000, including several substantial grants from various L.A. based foundations and, for the first time, a global grant for our local clinic initiative. The Material Charitable World Foundation, based in London and founded by George Harrison in 1973, has as part of its stated purpose "to help those with special needs," and, thanks to the generous assistance of Olivia Harrison, provided a \$100,000 grant for our clinic project.

Through the efforts of all of our supporters, we have become a known quantity in the philanthropic community. As you will see in other sections of this newsletter, the generosity of individuals and organizations has enabled us to commence construction of our clinic space and hire our first two clinic employees including our clinic operations manager. We expect to have the clinic licensed by the State of California and ready for patient visits by the Spring of 2013. It's an exciting time in our history, and we thank you all for continuing to help us transform vision into reality. ~Ted Tannenbaum

eleven year-old son, Merrick, who lives with autism. The family resides in Los Angeles where Dalva trains and sings opera. When Dalva learned, earlier this year, about Achievable's efforts to open a community health clinic for Los Angeles-area children and adults with developmental disabilities, she enthusiastically offered to lend her talent and rally fellow performers to support the project.

Along with Dalva, special guest artists Vladimir Chernov (Metropolitan Opera, Prof. of Voice, UCLA), Gary Gray (Collaborative Pianist, Santa Monica College), Joshua Guerrero (LA Opera Young Artist Program) and Dennis Parnell (Prof. of Voice, Santa Monica College) graced the concert stage and delighted the audiwith their operatic forte.

The concert program interspersed musical performances with inspiring speakers who offered personal accounts of challenges they face as individuals or parents of children with developmental disabilities. Dalva's son, Merrick, opened the program with moving words on his experience living with autism. Alan Davis eloquently conveyed the need for The

Achievable Clinic because of the lack of appropriate healthcare services available to adults who, like him, live with a developmental disability. And, Felicia Ford and Laura Luna spoke with warmth and candor, in English and Spanish, respectively, about the difficulties of meeting the complex healthcare needs of their children, a daughter living with cerebral palsy and son living with severe autism.

David Whatley, a classically trained singer, master's degree candidate and Dalva's close friend since the two performed opera together six years ago, bigheartedly volunteered his time and expertise as event coordinator and master of ceremonies for the evening.

Thanks to the generosity of the event's two main sponsors, Los Angeles Speech and Language Therapy Center and Manufacturers Bank, all additional proceeds from event sponsorships, ticket sales and donations will go toward The Achievable Clinic, which is currently under construction and expected to be open for patient visits in Spring 2013.
